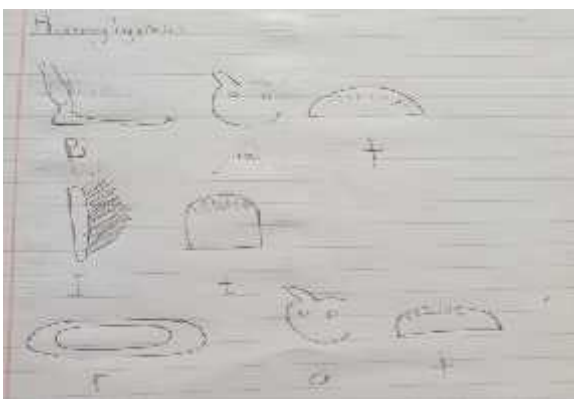
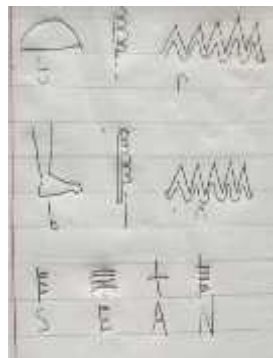
Springtime

The History of Writing by Seán, Olive and Beibhinn.

We looked at different types of writing that people have used. We first looked at the writing and symbols they used in the Stone Age. They drew people and animals most of the time they showed hunting. We looked at cave paintings in France and around the world, learned about hieroglyphics used by the Egyptians and discovered that the Romans used much of the Greek alphabet to form their own alphabet. It was so interesting to see that the drawings lasted so long and didn't disappear. Hieroglyphics was Egyptian writing. They used drawings instead of letters. We had a go making our own words. They used papyrus to write on. Our favourite though was Ogham because it is more of an alphabet and we could make more words from it. We found out that the people wrote on tall, thin rocks sticking up from the ground. We learned that Ogham writing was written vertically in a straight line instead of horizontally like we do. We practised writing different words on our whiteboards and in our books using the Ogham alphabet to help us. We did Ogham on white sheets of paper with black ground and used black paint. It was definitely our favourite

- J The Titanic started being built in 1909 and was finished in 1912, so it took 3 years to build. It was built in Belfast and was supposed to be unsinkable.
- J It set sail on the 15th of April 1912. It was supposed to go to New York and there were 2,200 people on board.
- J The Titanic was the most impressive and luxurious ship of its time. It was approximately 28 metres wide, 53 metres tall and 269 metres long - that's about the length of 3 football fields!
- J The Titanic had 3 classes: First Class was the most luxurious, Second Class was a little less luxurious but the food was good and there was a library. In Third Class, you had to share the bathtub with 700 hundred people.
- J The Titanic sank outside Newfoundland and 1,500 people died. It sank because it hit an iceberg.

What we have learned about the Great Famine in Ireland

The Famine	
What can you remember about:	
Ireland before the Famine: Ireland was mostly agricultural. The Irish were quite poor. People lived in stone cottages with no windows. Sir Walter Raleigh introduced potatoes to Ireland and they became the staple diet.	Sir Robert Peel (1845): Sir Robert Peel was the British prime minister in 1845. He imported cheap corn into Ireland and also set up relief work in for the Irish.
Irish tenants: The English were the Irish's landlords. Rent was high so the Irish were at risk of being evicted.	Lord John Russell (1846): Lord John Russell was the British prime minister in 1846. He stopped the import of corn and increased Public Work Schemes.
Why potatoes were so popular: The potatoes were so popular because they were easy to grow, they gave a good yield and they grew in even the poorest soil.	Black 47: In 1847 the potato was blight free but disease and hunger spread rapidly and it was the year with the most deaths (249,335 deaths).
Blight: The 'Potato Blight' began in 1845. If you saw dark spots on the leaves of the potato plant it had almost completely spread through the whole crop within a few hours. Every county was affected by the blight.

We started this term by painting some spring daffodils.

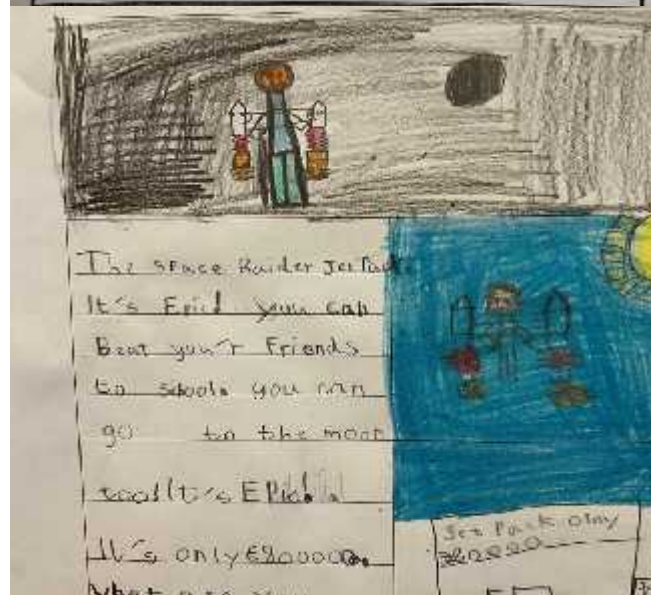
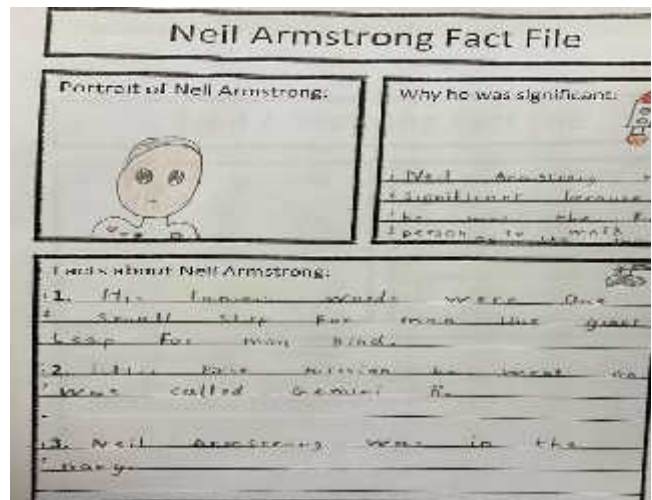
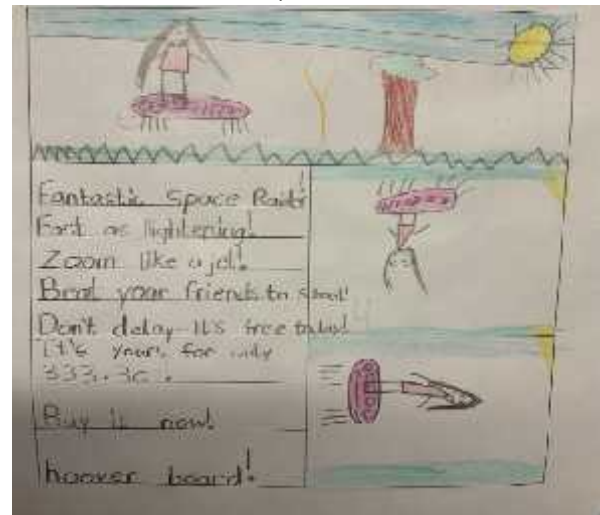
